### Cases

**Global cases:** Global cases exceeded 213 million on Monday (23 Aug) according to live data. The trend of 1 million new cases every 1-2 days continues.

### Latest response

**WHO urge for pause on booster jabs:** World Health Organization chief Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus has again called for a pause on countries issuing booster vaccines in order to share the doses with poorer countries to progress their vaccination programmes.

Dr Ghebreyesus said he was *“really disappointed”* with the vaccine disparity across the world and the volume of vaccines donated to poorer countries. Furthermore, if vaccination rates do not improve equally across the world, the risk of stronger variants developing increases. Whilst the WHO support the use of the booster vaccine for people whose immune system is compromised, who represent a small percentage of the population, there is not enough evidence that a booster vaccine is necessary for other people at this time.

**Israel to offer COVID-19 vaccinations in schools:** Israel has said it will offer COVID-19 vaccinations to students on school grounds, including during teaching hours, subject to parent approval, following the announcement the school year will begin next week. However, classes from grades 8 and above in cities with high rates of transmission would require 70% of students to be vaccinated or move to online learning.

**Next pandemic could occur within 59 years~:** A team of researchers and scientists from Italy and the US have warned that another pandemic on the scale of COVID-19 could occur within the next 59 years~.

The forecast was based on new analysis of novel disease outbreaks over the past 400 years. The research estimated the probability of a COVID-19 scale pandemic is 2%~ in any year, which is continuing to increase as a result of a number of factors, including increased travel, and humanity encroaching on natural environments resulting in a higher likelihood of zoonotic transmission.

The scientists have stated the study highlights the need to adjust perceptions of pandemic risks and the need for preparedness.

### Virology

**FDA approves Pfizer / BioNTech vaccine:** The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has given full approval to the Pfizer / BioNTech vaccine for use for those aged 16 and above. The vaccine is the first to be licensed in the US after being given emergency use authorisation in December 2020.

Pfizer / BioNTech sought full approval from the FDA in May 2021. The short approval process is the fastest in the FDA history. The decision will allow the manufacturer to directly market the vaccine to consumers and may result in mandatory vaccinations being required by employers in the coming months. The US military has said once the vaccine has been fully approved, it will become mandatory for 1.3 million service personnel.

The vaccine still has emergency use authorisation for individuals aged 12 to 15.

### Other developments

**China continues to push claims that COVID-19 started in the US:** Chinese state media continues to claim that COVID-19 originated in the US after being leaked from a lab at a military base in Maryland.

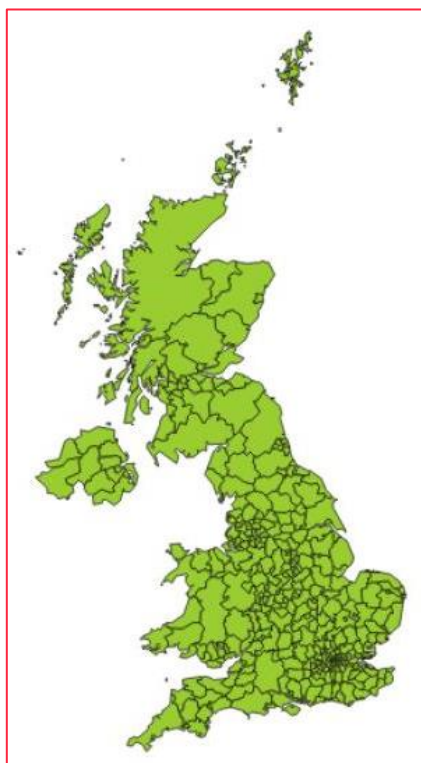
A state broadcaster aired a report on containment breaches at the lab in the military base in 2019, “The dark history behind Fort Detrick” in order to support the COVID-19 leak claims, suggesting there was poor lab security. It is reported that many Chinese people are convinced that the virus originated in the US due to the campaign.

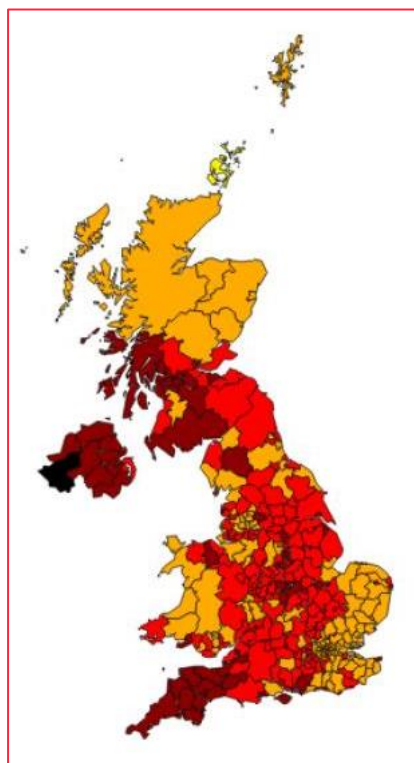
### Restrictions

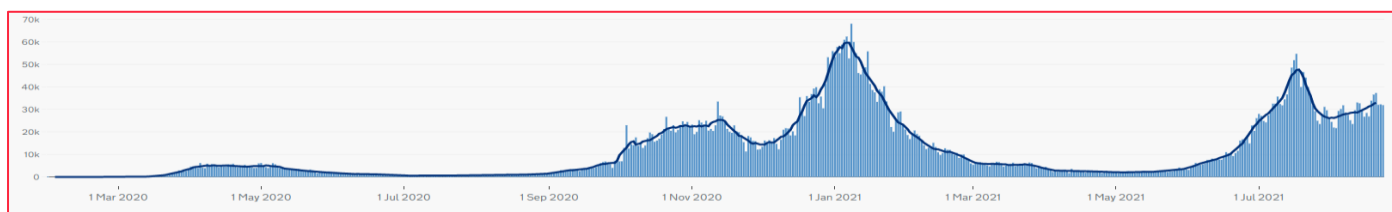

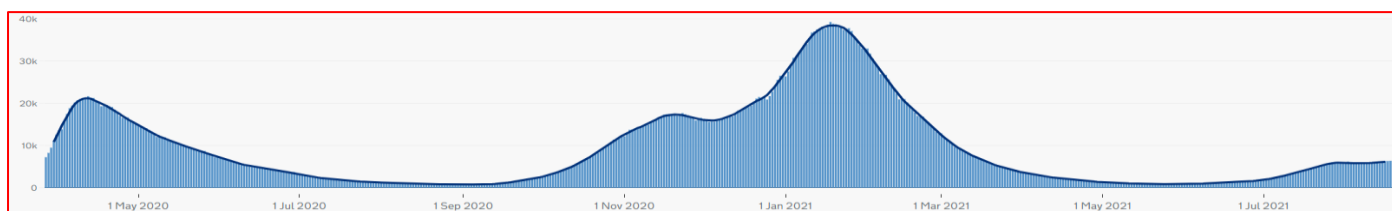

## Latest government update

**UK signs deal for additional 35 million Pfizer / BioNTech vaccine doses:** The UK Central Government has agreed a contract for 35 million more doses of the Pfizer / BioNTech vaccine, to be delivered from the second half of 2022.

The government, through the Vaccine Taskforce, is putting in place preparations to future-proof the country from the threat of COVID-19 and its variants through safe and effective vaccines, as the vaccination programme continues to protect the population.

These include robust plans for ensuring the country remains ahead of the virus for years to come and for any future booster programmes, as well as working to make the UK a global centre of excellence for the next generation of vaccines.

The UK Central Government has emphasised its commitment to supporting global recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic and improving access to vaccines and will be donating 100 million vaccine doses within the next year. The donation of the first 9 million doses was announced last month.

**SIU Comment:** The government is preparing for a booster programme this year to ensure those most vulnerable to COVID-19 are protected. The booster programme will be based on the final advice of the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI), expected in September. **End.**

**4,700~ cases linked to festival in Cornwall:** Officials have launched an investigation after 4,700~ cases were potentially linked to the Boardmasters festival held in Newquay, Cornwall between 11-15 August. Of the cases, around 800~ are reported to be local residents, with the other 4,000~ spread across the UK; 75%~ of the 4,700 cases are reported to be aged between 16-21, which fits the profile of the average festival attendee. Around 50,000~ people attended the festival.

The cases may be linked to direct attendance at the festival or socialising in the nearby area.

Cornwall currently has some of the highest neighborhood infection rates in England. However, local officials have stated they are reassured cases are not 'translating into a serious life-threatening illness' at present.

Attendees at the festival were asked to demonstrate their COVID-19 status via the NHS app before being allowed to enter. Organisers have stated that because of the measures put in place to confirm COVID-19 status, 450~ people who would otherwise have been at risk of passing on the virus 'did not attend or left the festival early'.

**SIU Comment:** It is almost certain that there are more than 4,700~ cases linked to the Boardmasters festival, however these may do undetected due to people not registering / mentioning their attendance when they go for PCR testing, or if they do not go for PCR testing at all.

While the majority of cases have not resulted in a surge in significant illness at present, the spread of the virus at the festival highlights the risk of super spreader events, with 50,000~ people travelling from across the UK to attend.

While younger aged groups are considered lower risk of severe disease linked to COVID-19, it has been evidenced that higher infection rates amongst this group leads to higher infection rates amongst older aged groups, including the most vulnerable. This further highlights the risk of the return of schools and universities in the coming weeks, at a time when COVID-19 is still circulating persistently in the UK, ahead of a challenging autumn / winter and flu season. **End.**

**Study indicates hospital patients more likely to infect each other:** Results from a study by the University of Cambridge suggest patients in hospital are more likely to become infected by other COVID-19 patients than by healthcare workers.

The study found that most of the infections recorded were between patients. The study used methods that combined viral genome sequence data with clinical information about individual's locations. This allowed researchers to identify cases where data was consistent with the spread of the virus occurring between patients in the hospital.

The study took place last year between March and June in 5 wards at Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and is peer reviewed. Results also showed that of 22 cases of infections that took place in hospital, 20 were the result of the virus spreading between patients.

## Outlook

**6 in 10 care homes may be forced to remove staff who refuse vaccination:** 60%~ of care home managers have indicated they will be forced to remove staff from the workplace based on current vaccination rates due to the UK Central Government's mandate that all care home staff must receive their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine by 16 September, to comply with regulations requiring full vaccination by 11 November.

From this date home staff who are unvaccinated will be banned from working in care homes (unless they are medically exempt).

**Changes to UK international travel restrictions lists:** Speculation is increasing over changes to the UK's travel restrictions lists, ahead of the official announcement expected on Wednesday or Thursday.

Turkish officials have stated they expected Turkey to be moved from RED to AMBER.

Morocco and Jamaica could potentially be moved to RED due to increasing testing positivity rates, although variants of concern do not appear to be a significant issue in Jamaica which may help to mitigate the move. Other potential candidates for a move to the RED list include Belarus, Dominica, Iran, Iraq, Kosovo, Kyrgyzstan, Montenegro, Morocco, Nigeria, Russia, St Lucia, and Uzbekistan. There is also a concern that Spain and the Balearics could be added to the RED list.

**SIU Comment:** Changes to the UK's travel restrictions lists have yet to be confirmed, and the above has been included to raise awareness of speculation in the media, that will remain unverified until the UK Central Government announces the changes. **End.**

## Other developments

- The director of Public Health in Cumbria has urged visitors to take a lateral flow test prior to visiting the county due to the high infection rates recorded in recent days.
- Anti-vaxxer's gathered in the ITN studios lobby (HQ of ITV and Channel 4 News) before heading to Google HQ in London yesterday (23 Aug).
- The pop up COVID-19 vaccination clinic at the Cabot Circus shopping centre in Bristol is set to reopen on Friday (27 Aug). The clinic was forced to close after 60 anti-vaxx protesters~ gathered outside on Sunday (22 Aug) raising concerns for staff and patients. Protesters campaigned outside the clinic urging people not to get the vaccine.

## Global intelligence picture

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### Americas

**Brazil:** President Bolsonaro has stated he will ask for officials to set an end date for the use of face masks as a means of reducing COVID-19 transmission. However, this could be mooted by states and municipalities that set their own COVID-19 restrictions.

**Peru:** Authorities updated the COVID-19 risk designations and extended existing restrictions to at least 5 September. Areas designated as Extreme risk areas have a night curfew between 2100-0400hrs. Indoor businesses can open with a maximum of 30% capacity. Very High-risk areas have a night curfew between 2200-0400hrs with a 50% capacity on retail and grocery stores.

**US:** Mandatory COVID-19 vaccines will be required for teachers and staff in public schools in New York City. Teachers will be required to have received at least one dose of vaccine by 27 September.

Officials in Hawaii have urged residents and potential visitors to limit travel to the islands to essential business only as the islands are concerned about Delta variant outbreaks.

### Asia Pacific (APAC)

**China:** China's health authority has reported no new locally transmitted symptomatic COVID-19 cases for the first time since the recent Delta variant outbreak began in July. Experts claim it is another sign that the "zero tolerance" approach is unlikely to change.

Authorities downgraded the Lehuojiayuan community in Fangshan District, Beijing from Monday (23 Aug) to low risk due to no new COVID-19 cases in the last 2 weeks.

Authorities downgraded restrictions in areas of Huanggang and Wuhan from today (24 Aug) to low risk.

**Indonesia:** Authorities announced the partial reopening of restaurants, shopping centres and places of worship from today (24 Aug). Shopping centres can operate at 50% capacity and places of worship can operate at 25% capacity.

**Japan:** The Japanese and Tokyo governments have urged hospitals in the capital to accept more COVID-19 patients as cases continue to rise and are reportedly considering expanding areas covered by state of emergency measures.

**Palau:** The island nation has reported its first cases of COVID-19 linked to 2 travellers from Guam. No lockdown has been imposed, with officials stating that while the island is no longer 'COVID-free' it is 'COVID-safe' as more than 80% of the population is double vaccinated. Before reporting the cases, Palau had been one of the last countries to remain COVID-19 free.

### Europe (EU)

**Balearics:** The Balearic government is considering plans to introduce a digital passport to gain access to bars, restaurants, gyms and large events. A decision was expected yesterday, with the measure coming into effect from next month, however, the government has postponed the decision until Balearic High Court has reviewed the case.

**Germany:** Nightclubs in Berlin are expected to reopen after a court repealed a blanket ban on dance events in closed rooms in the capital, but only for the vaccinated or those who have recently recovered from COVID-19.

Authorities modified entry restrictions for travellers from Brazil and Uruguay, which are no longer deemed COVID-19 variant areas on Monday (23 Aug).

**Montenegro:** Authorities extended restrictions to at least 10 September. Restrictions include a maximum of 100 people permitted to gather in public spaces. Businesses can operate with social distancing measures, but customers are required to have a National Digital COVID-19 Certificate, prove they are fully vaccinated, provide a

negative COVID-19 test result or have recently recovered from COVID-19. Mass gatherings can be held under the same requirements for attendees that are required for businesses.

**Spain:** A court has rejected a request by the regional government of Catalonia to reimpose a curfew in Barcelona and dozens of other cities, which would have impacted 20,000 citizens, because the measure was “disproportionate” as infections have fallen.

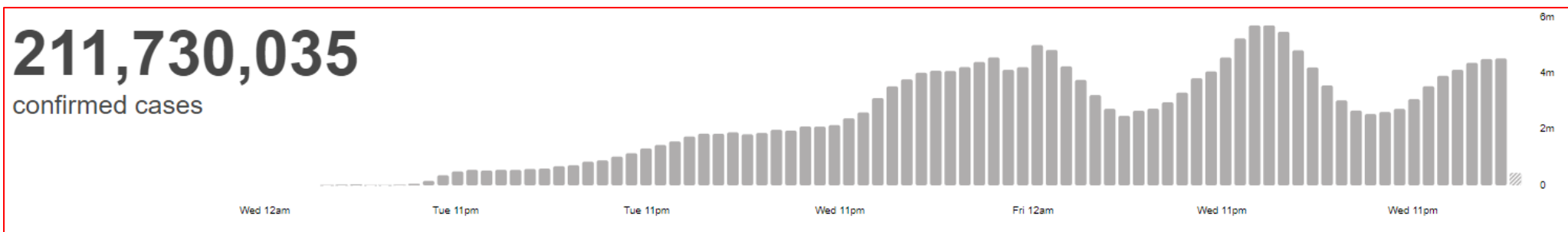
**Sweden:** The Health Agency has warned the country is likely to see a surge in cases over the autumn period. Cases over the summer have remained low throughout summer, however, they have started to rise again recently, and are expected to continue increasing as schools reopen and people return to work.

## Middle East, Africa, Russia & Turkey (MART)

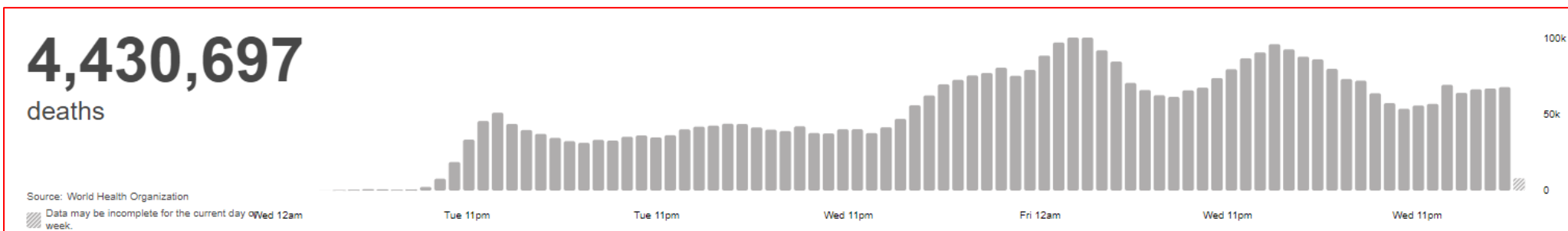
**Russia:** Authorities announced direct flights with the Czech Republic, Dominican Republic and South Korea can resume from Friday (27 Aug). The frequency of regular flights between Cyprus, Egypt, Hungary, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan will also increase.
